Jumpstart Toddlers

The 2016 Fall Session of the RNSFC Jumpstart Toddlers is now in full swing! The toddlers are exploring the classroom with the support and guidance of their grownups. They are actively engaged in all areas of the room, and learning about the materials available and getting to know each other.

As you know, children learn through doing and playing, exploring. Toddlers focus on what they see in front of them, what they are doing and the physical interactions within their immediate surroundings. These voung scientists are constantly exploring different activities to experience their impact on the world around them. This means lots of filling, pouring (well, dumping), shaking, banging, trying on and touching. It is through this trial and error that they learn how objects work, move and can be manipulated. Toddlers also rely on the predictable activities they have mastered, which brings them feelings of joy and success. This group experiences the materials both individually and as a cohesive group. They are beginning to demonstrate interest in each other, searching, playing, creating and investigating.

Our time together is also structured through routines of free play, snack, circle time and gross motor time. Free play is always a favorite. The toddlers move through the different areas of the classroom. A popular stop is the sand table, where they dig, fill, pour, sift, shift, scoop and shovel. This actually the foundation for mathematical concepts thev will encounter such as conservation. The art area fosters creativity though various modalities and sensory experiences. Painting with brushes, q-tips, rollers, cars and fingers, provides the toddlers with a tremendous creative outlet as well as exploration of cause and effect. They paint, collage, draw and create, create, and create some more! Fine motor activities include play dough, Magformers, blocks and puzzles. You can often find a number of children playing on the rug, pushing cars, organizing farms and creating jumbo Legos.

Books and literacy are woven throughout our time together. During free play, toddlers often sit with their grown ups or teachers and read books. A highlight of snack is story time, where the children interact with the large books and yell, "more books!" Pete the Cat is a class favorite and makes frequent appearances. During circle time, the toddlers are learning the songs, and beginning to sing and use hand gestures.

We end the day with gross motor time. Whether inside during inclement weather or outside on the playground, the toddlers love to run, jump, scoot, climb, toss and explore. They are working their muscles and continuing to develop coordination and balance, all while having fun.

It has been a true pleasure getting to know the toddlers and their grownups. We are honored to be a part of their first school experiences.

Twos Classes

Our classroom is humming with activity. The children are quickly learning the routines of the day and where everything is kept in our room. They are extremely comfortable finding what they need on their own, or asking an adult for help. Our dramatic play area is a favorite. Most mornings the children are making smoothies and cooking with play dough. The play dough is fun to use because it is so versatile, and the physical sensation of manipulating the play dough is quite soothing. Taking care of our "babies", feeding, dressing, and comforting them, is another popular activity. Vehicles of all varieties are also much loved, driving them on the scenic rug, through paint for an art project, or working with the large construction vehicles in the sand box. But the most popular activity by far is the water table. So far we have had a car wash, washed babies and gone fishing for sea creatures with nets. Why do we continue to have the same toys available day after day?

This is purposely done. Repetition in play is very important for young children and serves many functions. It often provides a secure base from which to explore a new physical and social environment. I like cars, (play I'm comfortable dough, sand). playing with them in this new place without my grownup. Maybe after I've used them for a while, I'll feel comfortable trying something else. For young children something "new", even novel toys, is the unknown, and that can be scary. A sense of comfort comes with the predictability of repetition. They gain confidence in knowing what to expect and what is coming next. And each time they play they are expanding on what they have done before. Children thrive with the repetition of experiences. In this vein we will continue to include the toys that help the children feel at ease, and sing the songs and read the stories that soothe them and bring enjoyment.

Our classroom pets have been a wonderful source of comfort, fun, excitement, and investigation. The children enjoy giving Cocoa and Honey, our mice, a treat to eat. They also like to see if the mice like some of the things they eat for snack. It turns out your children love apples and cheese and so do Cocoa and Honey! The children enjoy watching Cocoa run on the wheel, and looking for Honey, who prefers to hide in the hut. We have named our hermit crabs Stone and Pebble, after the rocky appearance of their shells. The children squeal with anticipation when we take them out. We put them on a tray and the children spray them with water. This gets the crabs moving and scurrying about. After we put them back in their tank they often climb up to the top of it hang upside down! Feeding our frogs, A, B and C is an activity the children request every time they

come to school. Leaving the classroom to get the food from the refrigerator is as much fun as actually feeding them the blood worms.

We often review the job chart as well because the children are extremely serious about completing their classroom duties. Ringing the bell, setting up for snack and choosing the songs are among the most coveted jobs so far.

We really enjoy using both classrooms during our open playtime. The children are able to choose from a wide variety of activities and peer groups each day. There is always something exciting happening! The children have labeled room 1 as the block room, as creations in the block corner often stretch across the whole room and onto the tables as well. The loft provides a great quiet space for a pair of children to play or to work with a teacher one-on-one. Our "big room" frequently becomes the spot for extravagant dramatic play scenarios and whole group art projects.

As the weather has gotten cooler, our class has been looking for signs of fall. We began by exploring nature items on our Noticing Table. We spent many mornings observing and discussing the various properties of acorns, pumpkins, leaves, and gourds. Many children were interested in opening up our sugar pumpkins and enjoyed pulling out the messy, gooey pulp. We also removed, counted, weighed, and cooked the pumpkin seeds we found inside. The children's favorite activity was a Nature Scavenger Hunt on the playground. Each child had a clipboard with a checklist and happily ran around outside gathering items. Back in the classroom, we sorted our items and will be using them for several art projects in the coming weeks. Feel free to let your children bring in a few "fall finds."

If children find fallen leaves, acorns, pinecones, etc. on their way to school they can bring them in to share with the class and add to our Noticing Table.

We are so thrilled with the children's transition into our class. We are pleased to see new friendships emerging every day. We are looking forward to an exciting school year.

The children in our class have all adjusted well to new faces, new spaces, and new routines and the room is humming with activity. The dramatic area is one of the favorite places for our children to pretend to have tea parties, take food orders from each other, and to have picnics. Our dress ups are many and varied and inspire much creative play. The art another popular area. table is Whether it is painting, gluing, collaging, q-tip painting or just cutting and using markers, the children love getting messy and creating masterpieces.

We have been busy with special activities. We have started to celebrate the fall season and we have begun discussing all the changes that occur during the season. We've also been enjoying the quintessential fall fruit-apples. We created graphs titled, "What is your favorite apple?" and "What is your favorite way to eat an apple?" After noting their choices, the children made observations from the graph and learned new comparative concepts like "more than", "less than" and "equal to". We have been listening to stories about apples, observed the inside of an apple and also baked with our apples. The class's first baking activity was applesauce cookies. The children were glad to be ale to help with the measuring, pouring and mixing.

Once in the oven, we filled the school with a delicious aroma. We also opened up our class pumpkin. The children helped take out all the seeds inside the pumpkin and then they wanted to eat them. We put salt on half of the seeds and cinnamon & sugar on the other half. Then we baked them! They were delicious! The children also had the opportunity to plant some of the seeds.

We are trying something new in the dramatic area. Every child will get a chance to offer an idea to transform the dramatic area, for a week. Last week the dramatic area was a supermarket. The kids made a sign, wrote out menus for food, brought in boxes to sell and took out the cash registers. They had a great time being workers and customers. This week the area is now a restaurant!

The class is very interested in science experiments. We have already explored with baking soda and vinegar to make eruptions, made Oobleck with cornstarch and water to explore whether it is a liquid or solid, and made Gak with Borax and glue to make a slimy, gooey consistency. Our class will continue to observe and make predictions during these science discovery times.

The class continues to enjoy the outdoors so please dress your child for the weather and the changes. Snack continues to be a social time where everyone gets to chat with his or her peers. Many thanks to all the families that have already sent in healthy snacks. The children have been treated to a variety of fruits and vegetables, hummus, cheese and crackers. All in all, the children have settled into the class with great ease. We look forward to an exciting year ahead!


